PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

- HMHS is dedicated as a memorial to the Haddonfield residents who were active and died fighting in WW1. Their names are listed on the 1926 dedication plaque in the HMHS front entry. This is the 100th anniversary of the Nov 11, 1918 end of WW1. Many of our alums have relatives that volunteered for WW1. Our HMHS is a reminder to remember all who served our country.
- Haddonfield Schools and alumni have welcomed our new superintendent of schools, Dr. Larry Mussoline. Dr. Mussoline has included a memo highlighting information about our wonderful students' work and the status of the repair programs in this newsletter.
- Just to brag a little, we were ranked 8th best out of all high schools in the COUNTRY for our sports programs by Max Preps. We were ranked FIRST in academic performance in South Jersey in the public school report card as published in South Jersey Magazine. All this with NJ providing Haddonfield schools among the lowest in state aid. Great teachers and coaches encouraging students at HMHS along with support from families are the main reasons for our successes. Our students are widely recognized for their academics, community services and other successes. Active involvement in community services is part of what makes Haddonfield the great place to live and go to school.
- The HAS has updated our website to be more interactive and user friendly for alums. All alums can reach the new site, www.hmhsalumni.org, to get updates regularly throughout the year. A number of you already use this feature to get monthly information on current activities. The Alumni Society allows our current and future Alums to keep up to date with what is going on at all the schools during the year. Your donations make us viable.
- This past year we assisted with a very successful Pig Roast to support the beautification project for the old courtyard by the cafeteria. This project was not included in HMHS renovations. Over \$18,000 was raised and HAS is supporting the pig roast again in the coming spring. 2018 SPORTS UPDATE

- During the 2017-2018 school year our teams compiled a record of 318 wins and 78 losses which gives us a winning percentage of 80%! Such a record led to winning 13 out 20 conference titles and participating in 18 sectional championship competitions (out of a possible 20). Also 5 Varsity teams finished their season with a fire truck parade for winning a New Jersey State group championship!
- Furthermore, for the 38th year in a row Haddonfield Memorial High School was the recipient of the Colonial Conference All-Sports Award (given to the school with the best conference win-loss record) and for the 15th straight year Haddonfield Memorial High School was declared winner of the NJSIAA Shop Rite Cup for Group II; an award given to the school with the most sectional and state championships for each of the 6 groups in the entire state. Haddonfield Memorial High School is the only school in the state that has won this award every year since its inception!
- Lastly, Haddonfield Memorial High School had tremendous athletic accomplishments during the past 4 years.. Our teams compiled a record of 1,161 wins and 354 losses which gives us a winning percentage of 76%! Such a record led to winning 41 conference titles, 42 sectional titles and 20 New Jersey state group championships in just the past four years. Few if any other high school in the state of New Jersey can match this record of championships.

Hallowed Words Leads To Hallowed Deeds For Dickstein

Haddonfield Memorial English teacher's humanitarian effort leads to unexpected experiences, rewards

- Many dreams have been fulfilled and many lives have been enriched by brushes with greatness: meeting your favorite sports figure, author, cartoon character or musician or having a famous borough resident return to their birthplace to mingle with the public. However, far fewer can say they have had the pleasure of meeting and speaking with, face-to-face, a sitting or former president of the United States as a result of extraordinary measures to aid those in need.
- Kimberly Dickstein clearly counts herself among the luckiest. Currently in her 10th year as a Haddonfield High School English teacher, Dickstein hasn't just concentrated her educational efforts to the intricacies of Shakespearean verse. She has availed herself of modern technology to give her students a glimpse of the world around them, and attempted to impart the lesson that a small group of dedicated citizens can come together make a difference.
- Dickstein just returned from Atlanta, Ga., where she met and shook hands with former President Jimmy Carter and his wife, former First Lady Rosalynn, at the Carter Center, which is dedicated to preventing and resolving conflicts, enhancing freedom and democracy, and improving overall health to underserved and impoverished populations.
- "I was invited to attend the annual meeting of the Carter Center Board of Councilors, which took place Sept. 12 with Garang Buk Buk Piol because of our tireless efforts to get him to Emory to begin his graduate degree. Garang was a victim of armed conflict in South Sudan and a former Carter Center Guinea worm eradication program officer. He was accepted to Emory's Masters in Development Practice program and began his studies three weeks ago."
- According to a piece by William Feuer featured in June on Philly.com, when the high school assigned its sophomores in the summer of 2015 to read Ishmael Beah's heart-wrenching tale of becoming a child soldier, Dickstein wondered how to best create an impact on her 10th-grade students. She was able to contact an old friend who was working at the time in Malawi, and they began a correspondence over Skype.
- This past February, Emory provided Garang with a spot in that masters program. Scholarships were able to cover most of his tuition, but to get a U.S. visa, he would have to prove he has the resources to financially support himself in Atlanta – and he didn't, according to the article.
- Enter Dickstein, who hatched the idea to get her friend the additional funds necessary. "I started a GoFundMe in June 2018, I invited any interested students to help with the advocacy campaign. Team Garang came together this summer. We were able to raise \$21,000 in three weeks by canvassing door-to-door in Haddonfield. This was no small effort. We still have to fundraise the tuition and expenses for three more semesters and will need to redouble our efforts moving forward."
- Dickstein's diligent work ethic is the living embodiment of the "think globally, act locally" mantra.
- She is a firm believer in the power of words to shape attitudes from centuries past into the present and beyond, recognizing Shakespeare's works have endured for more than four centuries and have empowered people from all over the world to take ownership of their humanity. She crafted her program of study around the philosophy that Shakespeare is for everyone for all time. And, as an advocate for the arts and humanities, she views Shakespeare as a vehicle to do good things.
- Students are clearly catching on. For this academic year, Dickstein boasts 65 students enrolled in a Greek drama elective for the fall, and she expects 74 students to take part in her Shakespeare elective course featured in the spring. When she began teaching the latter course six years ago, there were a mere 21 students enrolled. She attributes the growth of this program to the Bard himself, but adds "I might have played my part." Dickstein's role in this intercontinental tale has yet to come to an end.
- Since the response from the Haddonfield community has been overwhelmingly positive, she and her students plan to make a public presentation at the Board of Education's next meeting on Sept. 27. Garang himself will be making a personal appearance to meet his benefactors in the borough on Oct. 7 ahead of his visit to the high school the following day. An additional fundraiser is being planned to take place at First Presbyterian Church on Dec. 7. Date is subject to change. Proceeds from the event will benefit Garang's education fund and his work in South Sudan.
- "Shaking President Carter's hand meant more to me knowing that this man's tireless efforts to alleviate human suffering have empowered individuals like Garang to improve his own community by furthering his education. That moment was a tangible reminder that anything is possible."

Dear Members of the Alumni Association,

Thank you! Upon starting my work and tenure at Haddonfield I have heard only wonderful stories of contribution, support, care, and encouragement coming from our alumni. It is with great pleasure that I look forward to working together to continually improve the programs and undertakings of our school system.

Today, much as it was when you were all here as students, Haddonfield is a leader not only in Southern New Jersey, but throughout the state and nation. A few weeks ago, our district ranked number one in academic performance by Southern New Jersey high schools as per the 2018 Public School Report Card published in South Jersey Magazine. During the summer we received word our 2017-18 athletic program was ranked 8th in the nation among high school athletic programs by MaxPreps, a national web-based high school sports portal. The US News and World Report ranked Haddonfield Memorial High School the 25th best high school program in the state of New Jersey out of 511 high school programs in their spring 2018 publication. We have a high school teacher and five students invited to the Carter Foundation in Atlanta in a few weeks because of their work in supporting Garang Buk Buk, a former child soldier from the Sudan, assimilate into college and fulfill his career dream at Emory University. Whether it be academics, athletics or humanitarian interests, your alma mater continues to lead the way.

This year construction at all five school sites should conclude, but we are far from finished with our facilities improvement needs. After a challenging leadership transition period and after an arduous spring reacting to a public relations issue involving race, we are beginning to set our sights on long-range planning, stability planning, and quality standards. In a few weeks we will embark on a full-blown strategic plan, which hasn't been done in Haddonfield for many years. This will involve the greater Haddonfield stakeholder community and conclude with a set of big picture goals to guide the district into the future. From a stability standpoint we need to better communicate with our community and we need to stabilize many internal functions in the organization, including our perspective of diversity, equity and race. From a quality standards standpoint, we need to see what the state Quality Single Accountability Continuum (QSAC) review, happening in the winter, says about our district's fiscal strength, our district's governance practices, the state of our school facilities, our human relations function, and the quality and integrity of our academic programming. The results from QSAC will also lead us into the future.

Count this year as a year of self-reflection, analysis, evaluation, and planning to ensure that our current and future students enjoy the same outstanding Haddonfield education that you all received.

Thank you for all that you do for the students and staff of the Haddonfield Borough School District and good wishes to you all as you continue your work of giving back and sharing the wonderful memories of your time as a students in our schools.
