A Seventy-Fifth Reunion

In June of 1944, when Ed Priggmeier and Jack Schneider were classmates and already longtime friends, they graduated from HMHS with their nation at war. Unlike today, when every soon-to-graduate senior is peppered with the question, "Where are you going to college?", that spring seniors faced the question, "What branch of service are you planning to go into?" Seventy-five years after their graduation, these high school buddies, members of the "greatest generation" had a reunion in Georgetown, Maine.

Before their wartime experiences, Ed and Jack grew up with a group of Haddonfield friends who were nearly inseparable, Bill Cummings, Dick McCarthy, and Mel Logan were among that group. Ed grew up just off Grove Street and Jack on Ardmore Avenue in what was then known as "Haddonfield Estates". Jack recalled being very close to Ed and his family. "I was an only child and I loved to go the Priggmeier's where Ed had four siblings and lived on what was like a farm". Both recalled growing up in the 30's and 40's as a very special time. Jack noted, "My mom would pack me a lunch in the morning and tell me to be home by 6 for dinner."

They reminisced about their high school days and going to Thor's Drugstore at the corner of King's Highway and Tanner Street to hang out; about staying out late and stopping in the Bakery on Kings Highway to buy freshly baked cinnamon buns at 2 am; and of pre-football game trips to downtown Collingswood to march in the street and demonstrate their school spirit. Both recalled their high school principal, William "Bull" Reynolds, who according to Ed, "could freeze a whole auditorium with a glare". Jack's most unpleasant memory of high school was the sound of squealing pigs. He noted, "Across Kings Highway from the high school beyond the Baptist Cemetery, there was once a pig slaughterhouse and when the school windows were open, the sound of the squealing pigs could be heard."

After graduation, Jack and Ed stuck together, joined the U.S. Navy and headed to boot camp. Once their eight weeks of initial training was complete, the Navy sent the boys on their separate ways. Jack spent the last months of the war in the Pacific on a troop landing craft ferrying troops to Guam and the Hawaiian Islands. Unfortunately, others from their class including their close friend, Mel Logan did not return home. Mel was lost at the Battle of the Bulge.

After leaving the service both Ed and Jack returned to school. Ed attended Pennsylvania Military College now Widener University and Jack attended a dual program at the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts and the University of Pennsylvania that allowed him to take his fine arts classes at one school and his academic classes at the other. Ed pursued a career in business with Sun Oil Company where he became a corporate credit manager and continued executive training in the summers at Harvard University. Ed's work took him from Philadelphia to the Tulsa, Oklahoma area where he settled, raised his three daughters and continues to live with his wife of 67 years. *Continued on next page*

Jack spent six months living in Mexico, painting and following his bliss. He returned and worked as a graphic designer for the Air Force at the Pentagon. He pursued a career as an artist working in both oils and sculpting. He has enjoyed a career as both a renowned oil painter and sculptor of wood and ceramics and as a professor and chair of the Art Department at the University of Maine, Farmington. He and his wife raised a daughter and a son and were married for 66 years before her untimely passing a year ago. Ed explained that, "Jack and I had stayed in touch through the years and attended reunions organized by our classmate, the late Bill Cummings." In the past several years, the Priggmeier family has held an annual family reunion. Each year one of their daughters chooses the location and four generations of the family assemble for a week. This year daughter, Betsy Nye, chose York Harbor, Maine. Needless to say, these two men who had enjoyed an enduring friendship for 80+ years did not waste this golden opportunity. Ed and Jack agreed that this was a perfect time to meet as York Harbor is about 90 minutes from Georgetown. These hale and hearty 93 year old gentlemen gathered at Jack's home in Georgetown and reminisced about their days in Haddonfield, the Navy, mutual friends and family. When asked about their enduring friendship, Ed responded, "You know we just meshed".

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Haddonfield Football Records State Leading 20th Straight Win

Haddonfield Football Records State Leading 20th Straight Win

There are guys in new roles. There are fresh faces stepping into big shoes. But the bottom line remains the same ... and so have the results.

"Everybody on this team wants it and we all know what we're capable of doing," said senior Alex Kadar. "We have each other's backs no matter what. "It's not who we play. It's about how we play and we have that mentality every game."

The defending South Jersey Group 2 champion and winner of last season's inaugural South/Central bowl game, Haddonfield continues to win each week. The game plan is laid out. And while there may be a tweak here and there, it's executed.

Senior quarterback Jack Narducci connected with senior receiver Kyle Garstkiewicz on three touchdown passes Friday night as Haddonfield extended its state-leading winning streak to 20 games, overwhelming Cinnaminson 28-0 in a West Jersey Football League inter-division matchup.

"The faces change but the 'H' doesn't. The standard doesn't, the culture here doesn't," said coach Frank DeLano. "These kids sit in the stands when they're five, six years old and hopefully aspire to play on Friday nights under the lights.

"We weren't real good offensively in the first two weeks. This was a great showing tonight. I'm really proud of our guys. This was a dominating performance in three phases against a really good football team. They pass the eye test. That's a really good win against a really good football team."

The Bulldogs (3-0) haven't lost since dropping a 37-19 decision to Sterling on Nov. 4, 2017. They ended that season on a four-game winning streak, starting with a 17-7 victory the following week over the same Sterling squad in the first round of the sectional playoffs and ending with the first of back-to-back championships.

They went 13-0 last year, knocking off Camden in the SJ Group 2 final and beating previously undefeated Hillside in the South/Central bowl game at MetLife Stadium.

"We were the guys on the scout team last year helping those guys get wins," said Narducci, a first-year starter at QB who completed 8-of-14 passes for 124 yards and scores covering 6, 46 and 13 yards. "As long as we have kids who want to play and execute, we can be a really good football team.

"The day after MetLife, we had receivers on the turf getting ready because we knew it was our turn to step up. We really worked hard in the offseason. Overall, we just have guys who care about the game, care about winning."

While Haddonfield took advantage of its scoring opportunities, its defense was equal to the challenge. The Bulldogs had 10 tackles for loss and held Cinnaminson (1-2) to three yards or less on 25 plays.

The Pirates finished with minus-33 yards on 23 carries. They ran 38 plays resulting in minus-44 yards.

Kadar had an interception that led to what proved to be Haddonfield's game-winning touchdown in the first quarter, while collecting his first career sack in the fourth. Brandon Collins, Sean LaBrie and Jack McNamara also contributed sacks as part of a dominating effort.

Tommy Batson accounted for Haddonfield's other touchdown, a 1-yard run in the third quarter.

"A lot of people are looking to step up and prove they are good enough to play varsity," said McNamara, another first-year starter. "Defense has been pretty dominant in past games. It's been getting it done.

"We're not really thinking about the wins we had last year. We're just focused on what we can do this year, thinking about the next game and prepping as hard as we can."
